I wanted to use this space to finish a sermon I left unfinished in our series called DEEP! There will be much more of the depths that I am sure will be left unexplored, but I want to give you a brief synopsis of the practicality of Romans 2:17-29:

NOT PROFESSION BUT PRACTICE – vv. 17-24

Knowledge is an important thing.

We need to study the word of God, read commentaries and devotional books, listen to other preachers and teachers, and memorize scripture. Knowing what the scriptures say is an important tool for applying it to our lives

I know plenty of people that can discuss the Bible for hours. They have a lot of head knowledge but not a lot of practice.

Too many times, we want to tell other people how to live their lives and we'll tell them the truth: "Here's what the Bible says you should do." When it comes time for us to behave in a biblical way, we fail to put it into practice in our lives.

We know the Bible says, "You shall not steal" but we think it's okay to take a couple of illegitimate deductions on our taxes or take those pens and paper clips home from the office.

"Salute one another with a holy kiss. The Churches of Christ salute you !"

We know the Bible says we shouldn't gossip but we can't wait to fire up the phone lines or Facebook when we hear a juicy tidbit. We know the Bible tells us we should do everything without grumbling or complaining but can't wait to let people know that we don't like whatever is happening at church at the time.

NOT THE FLESH BUT THE SPIRIT - vv 25-29

Circumcision is a physical act that has spiritual implications. It was a reminder that there is no part of our lives that does not come under the sovereignty of God.--there is no part of us that is too private and intimate to yield to God's control.

Jews took great pride in circumcision. They felt that one time act determined their destiny forever. I know people that treat baptism the same way. One time under the water 15, 20, 30 years ago is all they needed to do. Their trust is in what they accomplished on that day and not on what God wanted to do in them. Paul very skillfully explains to those with such a belief that it's not what happens in the flesh but what happens in the Spirit that's important.

We become so full of pride in what we accomplish. I went, I did, I belong ...

When we will ever drop the idea that we can't do enough to earn our salvation?

There are no X's and O's on a chart. We can't balance our bad acts with our good deeds.

Our hope has been in what we've done or not done. --Don't drink, smoke, spit or chew or even go out with girls that do. Not what I've done but what he has done

v. 29 – "No, a man is a Jew if he is one inwardly, and circumcision is circumcision of the heart by the Spirit, not by the written code. Such a man's praise is not from men, but from God."

Circumcision is a cutting away.

--True circumcision is when we allow the work of God through the Spirit to cut away the things in our hearts that defile us.

Paul warns the Jews not to put their trust in their bloodline, in their knowledge of the book, or in their outward symbol.

Their trust needs to be in what God has done and is doing them through the death and resurrection of His Son and the work of His Spirit.

Enjoy your Freedom !

Because many Americans have never known other circumstances, it's easy to take our liberties for granted. The Israelites knew firsthand the oppression of slavery. Yet when God finally led them out of Egypt, they had problems adjusting to their newfound freedom. Fearful and rebellious, the Israelites grumbled against their leaders, Moses and Aaron, saying they would've been better off as slaves in Egypt.

Our freedom as Christians cost Jesus his life. But we, too, often find it easier to fall back into sinful habits. In Galatians 5:1, Paul offers this encouragement: "For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (NRSV).

We're no longer bound by sin and death. That "independence" is worth celebrating every day!

On vocation? Use GPS!

Many vacationers rely on a global positioning system to get them easily to a destination. But in every season of life, God sends us on *vocation* — following his call to both feed our passions and serve others. Our "calling," Frederick Buechner said, is "where [our] deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet."

But is there a GPS for *vocation?* It's not as detailed or predictive as we'd like. It doesn't name our destination at the outset, and it offers general instructions rather than specific directions. And we may end up "recalculating" our life route more often than our vehicle GPS recalculates our vacation route.



Even so, we travel in safety. This "GPS" might stand for God's Peace and Strength, or Gospel Promises Sustain, God Provides Salvation or Go! Proclaim! Serve! The GPS guiding our vocation speaks to us through Scripture, worship, trusted Christian friends, life events and the silence of our heart. Listening, we hear our Guide's calm voice and continue on vocation. —Heidi Mann
